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Introduction

For the past 16 years, the Phendulani Literacy Quiz has been part of the reading ecosystem in South Africa. This report is a snapshot of this year's quizzes, held around the country, with over **150 schools** participating in regional events.

This year, the *National Reading Barometer* highlighted the importance of access to books:

"Why does it matter if people read, or if reading is able to flourish in South African society?

"Reading gives us power – to learn new things, tell our stories, and **shape our futures**.

"It helps build a **stronger**, **more equal economy** and a **connected society**. It improves educational outcomes, economic opportunities, critical thinking abilities, empathy, civic engagement, and child-adult relationships.

"To improve reading in South Africa, a whole of society approach is needed.

"The production and use of reading materials is part of a wider reading ecosystem which includes adult reading practices, child reading skills acquisition, home literacy environments, libraries and community resources, social norms around reading, government policies and budget allocations, and digital access."



Franschhoek Phendulani: 19 May 2023

As the Franschhoek Literary Festival (FLF) had book lovers abuzz around the Cape village, the joy of reading was also spilling over at the local Groendal Secondary School as excited young readers vied to win the Phendulani Literacy Quiz.

The Friday morning event, cheered on by hundreds of Grade 7 learners, was closely contested with the two teams from the Dalubuhle Primary ending neck-and-neck. It took a tense tie-breaker to see Dalubuhle Team 2 win the day, with Dalubuhle Team 1 in second spot and Groendal Team 1 in third. Wes-Eind Primary School also entered two teams to compete in the quiz and Wemmersdal Primary one team, and shared in the literary excitement.

This is the second year that the FLF has brought Phendulani to Franschhoek, and it was another resounding success. The festival is a celebration of reading and literature, and it is wonderful that younger members of this community can also be inspired by the event.

Kicking off the Phendulani Quiz this year was a keynote address by local winery owner Paul Siguqa, whose recent acquisition of Klein Goederust has put him in the news. Siguqa, whose mother was a farm worker hailing from the Eastern Cape, gave the large audience of young learners a message of hope based on his own experience.

"Reading is your road to discover a wider world, and a brighter future," he said. "Books can take you to places you have

never dreamed of, and you do not even have to step on an aeroplane."

He recounted his own love of books from an early age, a

passion which his mother Nomaroma fostered enthusiastically

Learners voted for their favourite book and the graphic novel Kwezi won. Trevor Noah's book, Born a Crime was also popular if more challenging to read. even though she herself could not read. His reading opened up new worlds for him, he explained, and put his education on a firm grounding – so that he could later attend university and enter a career of his choice.

The quiz ended with cheers of jubilation and school teams became heroes due to their reading and comprehension. As they were leaving, one of the local helpers commented, "They had fun, listen to their joy, it was a great success". Reading books to stimulate literacy needs to be fun and relevant. The children loved the category "Superheroes" which linked USA superheroes, in books, with local superheroes Kwezi and Khoi, created by Loyiso Mkize. 70 % of the books read for the quiz were written by local authors. Other categories included School and Family life, Challenges and Identity.

Margate Phendulani: 18 October 2023

The Eastern Cape region's quiz is coordinated by Grey Junior School librarian Michéle Kerley.

"What I enjoy most is that I believe the pupils will always remember this moment and the pleasure that reading brings," Kerley said. "These good memories hopefully will further encourage the love of reading."

The quiz was won by Sanctor Primary scoring 32.5. Defending champions Heatherbank Primary scored 31.5 and placed second. Third place went to Papenkuil at 27/40.

The book the children most enjoyed reading was the Graphic Novel Coraline followed by Born a Crime. The least favourite books were the two Kwezi collections with a number of children reporting that they found Kwezi difficult to read. Neil Gaiman led the list of authors that the children would like to read more of. He was followed by Roald Dahl and Katherine Patterson.

It is interesting that the most popular books this year were the more demanding reads. Shorter novels were not preferred with the abridged versions of Jock of the Bushveld and Oliver Twist along with the two Kwezi collections being among the least popular of the books on offer.

They also ensure that every participant goes home with a book.

Headmaster Grant Butler, who is passionate about literacy, said there was value to being involved in the Phendulani programme. "This just shows that there is brightness everywhere," he said. "Despite the socio-economic problems and difficult schooling environments, there is brightness – but

you have to work hard to find it. We can never underestimate the importance of municipal libraries and we must encourage our pupils to use them."

The LEARN Project hosted the 2023 Phendulani Literacy Quiz on Friday 10 November 2023. Seven schools were carefully selected to participate in the 2023 Durban Phendulani Literacy Quiz out of the 24 LEARN Beneficiary Schools that The LEARN Project has established libraries and book corners in. Principals and Librarians of the seven selected schools joined a specific Quiz WhatsApp group where messages and details regarding the quiz were shared and inspirational tips were shared on the group to assist in the preparation of learners for the quiz.

The quiz ran smoothly, starting with teams participating in a warm-up and vocal activity. They then went to their designated team areas, and

selected their team leader to answer the questions and hand in the answers at the end of each round. Each team had a clip board and pencil with answer sheet for each round. Each question had a time limit in which to be answered and a buzzer was pressed when the time was up. This made the quiz fun and exciting.

The quiz was made up of four rounds and the official Phendulani Literacy Quiz questions were used. In between rounds, we held some fun questions and speed drills, which earned the winners either a chocolate or book prize, which they were delighted with. It also made the quiz day fun and exciting and helped ease nerves. We also had a dance session with the 'Follow the leader' song, with the message "Readers make leaders."

At the end of the quiz, we held a prize giving where the winning teams were announced and prizes and certificates were handed out. Team photos were also taken for each school.



Each school that participated won a gift bag filled with a selection of new books for their library and the Top 3 schools won extra books for their libraries. Each learner from the top three schools won a book to take home and a stationary set and every child who participated in the quiz received two activity books and a certificate.

Learners and teachers left the day motivated to continue reading and expanding their knowledge through the power of books.
